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for this to be ruled nongermane. It's been ruled nongermane. However, if people are going to talk, they're going to talk and I can't stop that from happening. Senator Louden has got the next amendment up. He's got the idea of using gambling for his purpose and to submarine the State Fair bill as well. I'm going to make the same objection to his piece but it's not my desire necessarily to cut off discussion. What I'll do is I'll yield the remainder of my time to Senator Brown. She can use of it what she will. I'll put my light on again. I'll call the question after a certain amount of time if that's necessary. We'll act on the question of the Chair's appropriateness and, by the way, the Chair was spot on. He was exactly right. The piece is not germane. I yield the remainder of my time to Senator Brown.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator, you can't yield time on a germaneness discussion. I'm sorry. So I will have to...unless you want to use the rest of it yourself or we'll move on to the next speaker.

SENATOR LANDIS: Oh, I don't have anything that interesting to say. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Were I Senator Landis and didn't want this amendment on my bill, I would challenge the germaneness as well. And I guess if I was the Speaker and was interested in expediting the schedule and that, I would have kind of a narrow reading of the germaneness rule. That's what I would do. I'm not saying that's what's happening here, but with all respect to the Speaker, I think that there is...if there is a germane amendment, it is Senator Brown's. If you look at our rules, it says germane amendments relate only to details of the specific subject of the bill. If you look at the E & R amendment for LR 209CA, it talks about games of chance. If you look at Senator Brown's amendment, it talks about games of chance. In addition to the details of the specific bill, it must be in a natural and logical sequence to the subject matter. The E & R amendment to LR 209CA, or LR 209CA as it is now, amends Article III, Section 24. You look
