SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I don't see Senator Preister, but I've got an amendment up there to make sure that the Environmental Trust Fund is treated the same way as the State Fair Board. But I won't touch on it now, but I want you to know that I put one up there. I'm also going to put an amendment that deals with the State Fair Board. The state should not just give money without any strings attached to an entity like this. It's a private operation, I believe. Let me ask Senator Wehrbein a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein. Is Senator Wehrbein available? Senator Chambers, I'm sorry, but he...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, I'll ask Senator Louden. He might know the answer.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Louden, are you available? Yes, he is. Senator Louden.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Louden, is the State Fair a private or a state entity?

SENATOR LOUDEN: Well, there's a State Fair Board and everything. I presume it's a...some type of an entity, because they're something like our county fairs, and there's people from all over the state that are on the State Fair Board. I'm not that familiar with it, but I'm just surmising.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you. Members of the Legislature, if you're going to do this, I don't think you should just turn money over to what in effect appears to be a private operation, with no guidelines. So what I would propose is that when you get to the part of this amendment that says,
