loop. I like this idea of the 10 percent match. I understand the argument that this is something rather specific, technical, perhaps cumbersome to do through a constitution, better done statutorily, but as I just said, I think in this area we have to work it through the constitution. I like the 10 percent match because one complaint that I have heard in Omaha circles is that Lincoln has taken the fair for granted; is not assertive enough in supporting the fair. And, of course, this would be a built-in component that would require some assertiveness from the leadership in the Lincoln community, so I support that. Because I support that, I believe it should be a part of this package. I guess I'll back off now and see how things actually play out. But just to conclude then, I'm all for putting it out to the people to decide whether a third component, the State Fair, should be part of the lottery mix, and I think we have to do it that way if we're going to keep faith with the people. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Maxwell. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. I haven't spoken on this particular constitutional amendment, either on General File or Select File, but I found myself getting really tense when I...when I hear this bill being described as a Lincoln bill, Senator Chambers. And I would just like, for the benefit of you and Senator Tyson, to read the roll call on the advancement of this bill to General...or to Select File. The ayes were: Baker, Beutler, Bourne, Brashear, Bromm, Brown, Byars, Combs, Cudaback, Cunningham, Friend, Hartnett, Hudkins, Janssen, Johnson, Jones, Kruse, Landis, Maxwell, McDonald, Mines, Mossey, Dwite Pedersen, Preister, Price, Schimek, Stuhr, Stuthman, Vrtiska, and Wehrbein. And if you had counted those names, like I just finished doing, you would see that there are only six people from the Lincoln area. Not even...I'm not even saying Lincoln senators, I'm saying Lincoln/Lancaster County. There are 11 people from Omaha who voted to advance this bill, and there are 13 people from other parts of the state that voted to advance this bill. This is not a Lincoln bill. It is not a Lincoln bill, Senator Chambers. And I might also add that there were two Lincoln senators who did not vote to advance this bill. So I don't know that you
