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Senator Landis? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would like to ask "King" Bourne a question or two, if he will consent.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Bourne, will you respond?

SENATOR BOURNE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: "King" Bourne, you've been a king only ten minutes and already you're acting like a tyrant. Here's the question I would ask you. Do you want to restructure that comment you made with reference to the way I drafted my amendment?

SENATOR BOURNE: Senator Chambers, actually I do. I had mistakenly read your amendment and I thought that it was drafted to my new amendment, and in reality it was drafted to the old one, so I misspoke.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And it takes a big man and a big good king, a wise king, to acknowledge his error. Now, "King" Bourne, would you like to humbly make a request of me?

SENATOR BOURNE: Yes. Yes, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What is your request, "King" Bourne?

SENATOR BOURNE: I would request that you withdraw FA1605.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Granted.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Chambers.
