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appropriating money for that, but I agree this is a local match. It's not a...it should not be some kind of subversion of the local match idea by being allowed to use state money in that 10 percent. And, by the way, I think we can solve that, you know, you and I together, another day, or in the appropriations process. But for purposes of our discussion, that is meant to be local match; private, city, county, township, agricultural society, but not the state of Nebraska.

SENATOR JANSSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And thank you, Senator Landis. Because Senator Landis is mentioning the various private...well, he didn't mention all the private, but the public entities or public-type entities, it's good that you don't try to list them all in a constitutional proposal. I'm still against it, but I want to put explicit language to make it clear that it is not to be any state money. We're not going to be here for the duration of this constitutional amendment. We have to do while we are here those things that might ensure the future well-being of the state and those people who are going to be here in this Chamber when we are gone, and that's what I want to do. I'm not blinded by this great love of the State Fair, and I'm certainly not blinded by any sense of loyalty to the city of Lincoln.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Time. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I rise to support the Bourne amendment. I think it's legitimate. Local match is fair. By the way, I do mean local. I don't mean subverted state money. Understand, by the way, that the \$300,000 that we had before in the state budget would have gone directly to the State Fair Board. I don't think Senator Chambers is saying that. This is, I think, Senator Chambers, concerned about subterfuge--state money masquerading as local match. I acknowledge that that's not what I ask for here. I don't seek state subterfuge. That's reasonable to me. And I intend to support the Bourne amendment as it's written.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Beutler.
