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withstand him. And he's here, we're here, and we can't withstand him now. Do you think his power is going to diminish, especially when he's dealing with new people and I won't be here to withstand him or oppose him at all? What is going to happen? I am looking at the state. I didn't like the state lottery. I still don't. I don't believe that state government ought to function on the basis of gambling proceeds. I wish the lottery would go away, but as they say, if wishes were horses then beggars would ride. So my wishes mean nothing. The only thing that counts is what I can get done on this floor one way or the other. Now I have turned over my hourglass. This is the fifth time that I've turned it so, turned it over, and it's about halfway through. I got to turn it over at least one more time. I said 8:30; I'm prepared to stay here till midnight now. Now Senator Landis is going to have to ask for cloture. Has he got 33 votes here for cloture on something like this? And the most effective thing for me to do is to keep us on this amendment. But he can call the question on it, can't he? I meant it's Senator Bourne's amendment. He can call the question. And then all I will do, because it will have been added to the bill, is put a whole lot of amendments up there and whatever the amendment...the amendment is that's pending is the only one that will be voted on. Then you vote for the proposition in the form that it's in at that time. I've got to see if there are any amendments on here that it looks like the senators might feel are necessary before they would vote cloture and, to quote my friend Senator Friend, send this bad boy on. As I look at the...I won't call it the agenda, the roster of amendments, I have one coming up, Senator Louden, in fact, I have two in addition to this one. I just don't like the way things are going here and I wish Senator Schrock were here. Is Senator Schrock here? I have another amendment that I'm going to offer to Senator Bourne's amendment, and it's to strike 10 and put 20, make them come up with 20 percent. I've been working with Senator Beutler on the water bill and I support what he's been trying to do, and I think our working together has brought about some changes in that bill and an understanding of what might be necessary to be done to give it a better chance to make it across the finish line. But I listened very carefully, and I supported Senator Beutler's position when he said these rural interests ought to pay more of the costs of cleaning themselves
