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up. They ought to pay a bigger percentage of that money. Well, now that we're giving this to Lincoln, why should Lincoln get away with 10 percent? Lincoln is a wealthy city. I saw something in the paper today, I think, where they talked about that ditch in connection with Antelope Park proceeding nicely, and you all made that possible. They've got the university, all these state institutions. They got a lot of money coming into their city. Why can't they come up with 20 percent? But I'm going to take it a step at the time. This amendment would say that no state money will be involved in this match, and I'm going to read the language for the sake of the record in case there is any discussion in another forum of what is going on. Senator Bourne's new amendment mentions that the match from the city can come from the city or any other private or public entities. I would put, after that, "except that no portion of such matching funds shall be provided by the state." You notice they use the word "entities." They didn't say political subdivisions or specify what is meant by that term. So it could encompass the state. If they don't want to accept this language, it's all right with me. I see Senator Schrock entering the room, and I'm not going to ask you right now because I don't...how much time do I have, Mr. President?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Two minutes and forty-two seconds.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I think Senator Schrock, even though he has dined sumptuously, he might can make it to his mike in that amount of time. And if so and he is willing, I would like to ask Senator Schrock a question.
