SENATOR BROWN: ...the very act of substitution, as a way to say that they can't be held responsible for the results that were found if the DNA is not accurate. I agree with Senator Landis. I think what it does is say that there has to be another test rather than that we should say...encourage that kind of wrongdoing. But more importantly, because Senator Chambers uses the word "any body fluid" and the reliability of DNA testing on urine is just not there, I don't know how we can make policy that says that we're...that we're going to let this person continue in their employment. I think it puts...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BROWN: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion on the motion to return for specific amendment, Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President, members of the body, I thought I might just review where we're at on this bill and how we came to be where we're at. You might call this the snowstorm bill. There was rather inclement weather, in fact, a pretty good snowstorm on the first time through; and on the second time, the weather wasn't a whole lot better. What we intended to do with the original bill, and my purpose was looking at DNA legislation strictly from the criminal standpoint, the original laws that were passed in regard to this were set up with the instigation, you might say, of the federal people in this line and it was called the DNA database and it set up what was called the CODUS system which was the combined DNA index system. The original law applied basically to sex offenders and very violent criminals. Subsequently, it has been found in other states that getting DNA samples of other convicted felons has proved to be very useful. The two that are the most useful are to get DNA specimens from burglars and robbers, and that there is over a 50 percent crossover with these people doing the violent and sexual crimes that we alluded to. So these are the two biggies. Since there is a question here of the amount of money that we have to spend on this, we cut it down to those two. The other
