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an embryo, will not offer similar legislation to protect women. My third point would be that, in keeping with what I had just said, I want to acknowledge how I tend to favor women, because I love women, in the proper way of course, that I respect women and, because of that, I listen to women, one of whom is Senator Schimek. She and I had a conversation about this bill the other day and she gave me the following advice--pick your battles--words to that effect. Only three words and I have to paraphrase because I don't remember exactly what she said, but pick your battles. So I told her I'd think on it. She told me what she was going to do--make a few comments and pull her amendment. I said, oh, so you're going to cut and run, huh? In the meantime, I did think on what she said and I told Senator Schimek that I'm going to have a few words to say and that will be all for me, too. But then I listened to Senator Foley and I think what Senator Foley said we ought to do is discuss the bill. That's what Senator Foley said we should do: We shouldn't be talking about people off the floor who don't have a microphone; if we're going to attack him, attack him, but we should discuss the bill. And since that is his desire, I will allow his desire to overrule what my stated intent to Senator Schimek was, and I will discuss the bill. I doubt that all that I have to say on the bill can be done on this one motion to return. Since it is unlikely that a sufficient number of my colleagues will break out of their lockstep posture and give enough votes to return any proposed specific amendment...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to Select File in order that it might be considered for adoption, I shall offer only this motion to return, but there are other motions that I will offer, which will give me a chance to further discuss the bill. Oh, I still have a few seconds?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You do, Senator Chambers, about 30.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, thank you. It's funny.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I'm sorry.
