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wish Senator Combs would not get into these kind of discussions because there's a certain demeanor that I try to maintain, Senator Combs, and you make it difficult. But back to the matters at hand, and notice I made the word "matters" plural. I'm not just looking at LB 172 and the damage that I think it does, the disrespect and lack of regard for our young women, but the process. Senator Smith is kind of smarting a bit because he thought he had won when he tried to...when an attempt was made to invoke cloture and it was one vote short. And I've tried to let people know that as long as the session is going, a battle doesn't mean you've won the war, and ground that is gained in a battle must be fought for in order to hold it. So until the motion to adjourn sine die is adopted, the battle continues to rage. When people put all that they have in one shot and they miss the target, they're through, so you have to pace yourself. And some battles carry over from one session to the next. I am going to continue to address matters that I think relate to the welfare of the Legislature as an institution. I could do that on a point of personal privilege if I chose, but I don't want to do it that way. I want to do it in the course of our discussions. The first point that is available for personal privilege is the reputation of the Legislature. Then the second one in order is the reputation of a specific member. I believe that the Legislature is perceived as a group of people who will turn entirely around if somebody with some kind of business designation attached to his or her name tells the Legislature, don't do what you were thinking about doing; do it the way I say do it. How many of you have more money because Clifton, James has a lot of money? I'll bet not one of you was invited when those thousands of world leaders were brought to Omaha to come and meet those world leaders. Which one of you? Not one. No, not one. By the way, I'm glad Senator Foley paid enough attention to learn something about prepositions, the foreign policy in Afghanistan, and whatever the other issue was that he said he learned something about. See, he learned even when a discussion was going on against his bill, because he paid attention. And if a lot more people around here would pay attention, they'd learn something too. So I give Senator Foley credit for that. But the fact is, he learned something in the area which is not most important for me. The area where he needs to learn something is on the issues before us that we vote
