SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...always provided. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Chambers, there are no more lights on, so you're recognized to close on your motion to return.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, I'd like to ask Senator Foley a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley, would you respond?

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Foley, are you interested in making a deal this morning?

SENATOR FOLEY: (Laugh) Yes, I guess.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you will invoke cloture, if you tell me that's what you will do when I sit down, then I won't offer...naturally, I wouldn't be able to offer another amendment. But if you don't attempt to invoke cloture now, I can't tell you how long we'll go. And I don't think our colleagues are going to want to stay here too long today, because they've probably made plans. If you let too many of them go and you cannot get cloture, then you know what the result is. On the other hand, I don't know if enough people have been alienated so that you won't get cloture anyway. So what do you think of that as an offer?

SENATOR FOLEY: Well, Senator, going into this debate this morning, I knew that I was going to be in for some opposition and I gave some thoughtful consideration as to what would be fair in terms of the amount of time that ought to be devoted to the bill before I call cloture, if I would need to call cloture. And we've been on it about an hour thus far today and there's kind of an unwritten rule that you go six hours or so on General File, four hours or so on Select, and maybe two hours or so on Final Reading. It's not written down anywhere, but that kinds
