SENATOR BAKER:      ...in the case of birth certificates, I know that the reason we require birth certificates is simply kidnapping children, moving around, and actually they were under an assumed name and we were trying to prevent that.

SENATOR BOURNE:      Okay.      So, Senator Baker, the Department of Motor Vehicles had drafted this amendment and it takes back some provisions and makes them as it was in the original green copy of the bill, or...

SENATOR BAKER:      That is correct.      We...for whatever reason, we got things to where...I believe you're correct and that we had at one time, and I'm...I got to stop and think about this, too.      We had at one time taken out one form of ID but we changed the Social Security card requirement.      That was an amendment you...I...one of us ran.      If they could not obtain a Social Security card, then we would do, in lieu of that, an approved U.S.-based document.

SENATOR BOURNE:      Okay.      Senator Baker, I'm going to go read through the amendments that we discussed.      I think we're putting something back in that we, as a body, had taken out at a previous level of debate, and that...

SENATOR CUDABACK:      Time.

SENATOR BAKER:      ...the multiple forms of identification required.      Hopefully, somebody else who participated in the debate will discuss this as well.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      Thank you, Senator Bourne.      Senator Connealy, on the motion to return.

SENATOR CONNEALY:      Thank you, Mr. President and members.      As I look at this and talk to constituents back in my home district and think about what we're trying to accomplish here, and I want to take pause and look at how we're putting more and more restrictions for people to get legal on the roads.      I'm worried that we're going to have more and more people driving our highways without license, without being identified.      The more
