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SENATOR BOURNE: I realize it's late in the day. Again...okay, if the state...is the state identification card an alternative form of ID?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, it is.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay.

SENATOR BAKER: It is accepted, yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Right. But what we're doing with your amendment, this AM2936, is we're making that card harder to get, are we not?

SENATOR BAKER: We're harmonizing. Right now we've got one section of the bill that says one form, and another on page 32 that says two forms.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay.

SENATOR BAKER: And I understand what you're...your point. You want to go to leave it at one, change this on line 11, page 32.

SENATOR BOURNE: Right, because that's, I think, the policy decision we made on a previous level of debate. What I'm saying is the state ID card should be obtainable, and that should be an alternative form of ID. And you're saying that it should be a little harder to get a state ID card.

SENATOR BAKER: Well, that's been the policy of the state up until now when we got crossed up on various amendments, that we ended up with one section of the bill stating two forms and another section of the bill stating one form for a state ID card.

SENATOR BOURNE: Right.

SENATOR BAKER: I understand what you're saying. It's a policy question.
