SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. Are you opposed to changing the language on line 32 (sic) that would only require one form of ID for the state identification card?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes. I honestly think it's a policy we want to maintain as we have it now, two forms, for whether it's a driver's...or an ID card, yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. Thank you, Senator Baker. I'm in opposition to the motion to return to Select File, and I'll be in opposition to AM2936. Members, as a Legislature, we made a policy decision at an earlier level of debate to require one form of ID, and now what we're doing is we were allowing one form of ID or, if they can't produce the certified birth certificate, they can produce another form of ID, and that form of ID could be the state identification card. But what Senator Baker's amendment is doing is making the...in order to get a state identification card, you have to provide a copy...a certified copy of a birth certificate that's unobtainable in these situations because if they could obtain it, they wouldn't need the state ID card. I...we're reversing a policy decision we made. What Senator Baker is advocating, and the Department of Motor Vehicles is advocating, is a prohibitive measure at obtaining a state ID card, which is an alternative form of identification for purposes of obtaining a license, and that doesn't make sense. If we say there's one form of identification or another to get a driver's license, but the other form of identification is too hard to get, what have we gained? We're still denying people the opportunity to get driver's licenses. And here's why this is relevant, to me. I had a constituent who married an individual from...it was a South American country, I can't remember--Guatemala, it was. Thank you, Senator Aguilar. It was Guatemala. And she married an individual from Guatemala, and somehow he could not provide a certified copy of his birth certificate. And they had...or there was a problem with his identification, and it's kind of a long story and I'm not telling you that I understand every aspect of it. But I can tell you that if he can't obtain the certified birth certificate, and yet the requirements to get a state ID card are also a certified birth certificate, this individual who is here legitimately won't be able to get a
