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the same system?

SENATOR BAKER: Well, this is a state system for any person who wants a Nebraska state identification card. It's not just state employees. This is anyone. And they would apply for these through the treasurer's office in the county, you would think, in which they would reside, although they don't have to use the county in which they reside. This is a state ID card and I...my best example would be my grandchildren have a state ID card that says this is who they are, a photo ID card. And in fact, for travel purposes I believe now you have to have a photo ID card regardless of age. I'm not sure, maybe there's an allowance for very young children, but...

SENATOR JOHNSON: So that if our county assessor or his assistant would have this card that he goes out to the landowner and this would be...suffice for identification?

SENATOR BAKER: As far as proof of identity as to who they are? That's not the purpose of this. I know what you're referring to, similar to our card, I would assume. Is that what you're equating this to? It says, State Senator Johnson. That's not anything to do with this. I don't know what the form of identification required of, say, a treasurer or an assessor. I don't think there's any special requirements.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Okay. Well, the reason I asked this is that at a committee hearing a few months back when this was brought up, someone from the driver's license bureau did not oppose what I was saying but came in a neutral position and...but did raise lots of objections to county officials being able to use this system to...for identification cards and so on. And that's what's got me confused. I'll yield the rest of my time to Senator Baker. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: How much time do I have, Senator Cudaback?

SENATOR CUDABACK: About 2, 11.
