Nebraska, they're not going to validate your Social Security number, they're going to let you use all these other things, and so on." I don't want to go there. I think it's irresponsible. We need to put this, what they've been doing, in statute so that we know it's there when we change the agency director and personnel, it's there. I think it's prudent. As far as the concerns that Senator Synowiecki raises about errors, 997 out of 385,000, that's a mighty small group of people that obviously could not resolve their problems they had with their Social Security card. I don't believe we want to just open it up and let those 997 obtain...use that as a form of ID by simply just presenting a card and never validating it. I think that's the wrong way to go. We need to continue the policy that we're on, put it in statute, and we know where we are as a state when it goes to checking Social Security cards as presented for applications on driver's licenses and state ID cards. So I oppose the motion to return to Select File for AM2962, for those reasons. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Bourne, on the motion to return to Select File.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I would agree with Senator Baker that 997 numbers...or individuals who are unable to be validated is a small number, unless you're one of the 997 who were denied a driver's license or had a driver's license taken away. But be that as it may, Senator Baker, would you yield to a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker, would you respond?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, I would.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Baker. Earlier when you were discussing AM2936, which you have now withdrawn, you indicated that there was a conflict in the Final Reading version in that in one section, to get a state ID card, it requires one piece of ID and in another section of the Final Reading copy, it requires two pieces of ID to get a state ID card. Is that accurate?
