SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. This is the final form of the amendment worked out by Senators Landis, Brashear, Brown and your humble colleague who is speaking to you. We have taken care of anything in the language that might be confusing and, to sum it up and not take any more time than is necessary, pursuant to discussions that Senator Landis and Senator Brown had as to the consequence of a test being taken and it establishing that an earlier test was on fluids from somebody other than the person accused, the amendment as it stands now will simply say that if that second test which is taken shows that the first test was on fluid from somebody other than the accused, that mistaken test cannot be used to establish wrongdoing on the part of the person who is accused. So now to sum it up, a test made on somebody else's fluid cannot be used to prove wrongdoing on the part of somebody else. If you have any questions, I will answer them, but before I do that, I'll ask if Senator Landis would like to use some of this time.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I will just to confirm that I think, in fact, this clarifies what I had regarded was an ambiguity. It may or may not have been an ambiguity, depending on your perspective. I believe that the humble senator from the District 11 did not see that ambiguity, but we've worked it out so we both recognize and agree as to the working principle which I think is a fair one, an eminently fair one. I support the amendment and I'll vote to return it, adopt the amendment, readvance it and vote for the bill.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President and members, the language certainly addresses some of the issues that I have. I'm still concerned about the reliability of DNA tests on urine samples which is the primary form of testing currently available for drug and alcohol, and so I think that there's some question about the reliability of this. But I will vote to return the bill and I will not vote for the amendment, but I will vote for the bill even if the amendment is attached. I would like to
