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There are other body fluids, there are other bases for charging an employee with wrongdoing other than drugs and alcohol. But that's all that I will say, just to try to make clear as I can that the bill extends beyond just drug and alcohol accusations or urine as the only body fluid that can be subjected to DNA testing under this bill.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Mossey.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would just rise in support of Senator Chambers' AM3408 to LB 139. I agree with Senator Chambers in the aspect that there are a lot of scenarios where you can be accused of something and where DNA evidence is the most accurate evidence that you could come across. I'd much rather rely on DNA evidence than urine. For example, I've had urine testing samples done before and there's a lot of things that can be picked up in urine where you not...didn't do nothing wrong; you'd be on a certain medication and it will detect something. So, I'd just rise in support of the Chambers amendment, and as far as the accusations that are made against people and how this will help in that area. I return this back to...

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Mossey. (Visitors announced.) Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I just rise for a short minute and that is to support the Chambers amendment. I think what we've accomplished today is we had an excellent bill and I think that we've made it a little bit better. So I would ask support of the Chambers amendment and of the bill itself. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, this is too good and I can't take credit for it. As Senator Maxwell, who sits at least on the fringes of the culture corner said, if it's not your fluid, you didn't do it. (Laughter) Thank you.
