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page 9, line 21, I think, where it speaks to these exemptions: Any county, city, or village which adopts or enforces a lighting and thermal efficiency ordinance, resolution, code, or standard may waive a specific requirement of the Nebraska Energy Code when meeting such requirement is not economically justified. Could you educate me on the mechanics of that? I mean...

SENATOR FRIEND: Sure.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...do they have...say they come into south Omaha, they want to renovate the old courthouse, built in 1910 or whatever, and they need specific exemptions. Do they have to go through a laundry list of each and every specific requirement that they're exempting? Or will they be able to get a blanket exemption for that one building? I mean,...you know, educate me on the logistics of that exemption procedure.

SENATOR FRIEND: I...the way I understand it, Senator, is that what is going to end up happening, based on the adoption of that amendment, is that that particular code official or jurisdiction is going to write or communicate with the Nebraska Energy Office in order to receive either that blanket exemption or a specific exemption, depending on what they can accomplish or what they can...or what they feel like they accomplish or what they can accomplish, and if they can show that that economic hardship would be something that they just couldn't overcome. I...so the answer is both, I believe. I believe that there is enough ability for the Energy Office and those local jurisdictions...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR FRIEND: ...to make those determinations, you know, on a case-by-case basis. But if I'm misleading you on the record, I just want to say that that's what I believe. If I'm misleading you, I will correct that, and we can, you know, get that straightened out. But that's my understanding. But if it...okay.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: One last question. The State Energy Office cannot then overrule a local municipality in an exemption?
