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one community because they interpreted it a completely different way. And then you have contractors complaining in the community next door that, well, gee, they don't have to do...

SENATOR HARTNETT: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...it but we have to do it. And the value of uniformity then becomes a detriment and the pressure on this kind of exemption keeps mounting and mounting until more and more municipalities are using it. Then the exemption becomes so broad that the rule is denigrated to a large extent. But you're not envisioning anything like that.

SENATOR FRIEND: No. Thank you, Senator. No, I'm not, because I think that we have dealt with that, not only in the amendment, but also with the conversations that we've had with all the stakeholders. I don't see that as being a problem at all. I mean I see, again, the Energy Office, from a service, education, and resource standpoint, moving everybody in this direction. We are staring at uniformity anyway because we're looking at a lot of jurisdictions who have no uniformity now. And this will create that for them with the help of the Energy Office and it's going to be a very permissive, workable relationship that I...

SENATOR HARTNETT: Time.

SENATOR FRIEND: ...that's what...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Senator, thank you for your good work.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Friend has such passion for this bill that I'm going to yield my time to him.
