say on another bill what Walter Scott Jr. is doing in terms of giving money to political parties. Why don't you go to him and ask him for some money for something like this? He didn't pay off what he owed in late fees to Accountability and Disclosure. The same with David Sokol. Scott was number one giving to the "Repelicans." Sokol was number five. They're two out of the three who couldn't find a way to pay off those \$25,000 or \$26,000 in late filing fees that their committee owed. So before you let all of this talk go forth without being challenged, about the generosity of all these rich people and benefactors, let them demonstrate it by...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...giving money where it might make a difference. But they are not going to be conned like you can con the people on the floor of this Legislature. They know that that money is not going for children. They know what the State Fair is, and they see through it. And you would never make the approach to them that you're making to your colleagues who've got stardust in their eyes. This money should not be put back into the bill. It's not something that we can pop our finger and recover. You talk about all these new people on the State Fair Board. Let them demonstrate their worth by going out and raising some money. If they can't do it, then they're going to come back to the Legislature next time and say, well, you gave it to us; if you had left us alone maybe we wouldn't be here now, but you kept us around; now you got to keep on keeping us around. It's like a dope addict. You give the person the drugs, and you don't help them get off by giving them a fix this time. You help them through this particular crisis, then when it comes on...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...them again, they got to get another fix. Thank you, Mr. President.
