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then perhaps we need to look at cutting back those days. I think, like Senator Pederson, Senator Don Pederson said earlier, if there's no incentive for the Fair Board to look at how they operate by removing this money, they continue to pay for things that may not be essential, and we then help them to do that by giving additional funds. The amendment has already been put back in the bill, but I think at some point during this discussion it would be very useful to the members of the body to know if in fact we are subsidizing horse racing at the State Fair and, if that's the case, to what tune are we subsidizing it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Preister. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, I would yield my time to Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR BROWN: Yeah. Oh, do you want me to go ahead? I'm sorry, (laugh) I will not yield my time to Senator Wehrbein. I'll go ahead and answer the question that has been posed, even though I don't want to talk about that right now. But there was one document that was passed out in one of the earlier pieces, that it appeared that there was a subsidization of horse racing by the State Fair. They had allocated all of their expenses towards that, because that was the place that they have an ongoing revenue stream. So it only appeared to be that way. That is not the case at all. It's just that all of their expenses were allocated to that, because they didn't have income projected for the entertainment part of the fair itself. And so all of their administrative expenses were allocated. I want to try to drag us, kicking and screaming, away from the small amounts--and I'm not saying that \$300,000 is not a significant amount--but the small amounts, to some of the bigger amounts, to some of the discussion that I believe that as "statespeople" we have to have. And I worry a little bit about the Redfield
