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up with a profit. The reason it shows a loss on the schedule is they charge off the depreciation and some of the other nonrelated costs incurred by the fair to horse racing. I'm not sure why that's done. I questioned it when I was on the board why it was kept that way, but I just...I guess the rationale was years ago, when the state...when the horse racing made so much money, they decided to charge more of the costs off to horse racing, and I just need to correct the statement that it actually in total doesn't lose money. I'll give some of my time to Senator Janssen, who has wanted to say a couple things. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Simulcasting is about the only thing in the race industry right now that does make money. You have to have so many days of live racing in order to have simulcasting. Now, why the State Fair has so many more days to have the simulcasting I'm not sure, unless it would be the fact that there are a lot of Nebraska-bred horses who like to run within the state. We only have the Grand Island, and I believe Columbus still has a few days, and the fairground, and Horsemen's Park in Omaha does have a couple of days a year. But the simulcasting is what keeps...actually keeps live horse racing alive. And if you look at the sheet that was passed out when we were debating the constitutional amendment for the State Fair, that is the book that Senator Preister has, it does show you a defect there in next...the next biennium. But then it advances as, down the 10-15 years, it shows a growth that is going to occur in the profitability at the State Fair in the live racing and the simulcasting. So that information that I attained from the State Fair people, I too wondered why it showed such an expense or a defect there in the next ensuing two years. But that's the reason for it, and I hope you can understand that. Thank you.
