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SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Synowiecki. I'm just...I want to get a sense of exactly how much money this will save. I don't dispute for one second what Senator Baker is talking about, that it's a good program and that. But, you know, I'm kind of with you. I think we need to make some structural changes. Because if we don't do it this year, we're certainly going to do it the next time we set our budget, when we're looking at a 300-plus million-dollar deficit. You had mentioned you're going to put about \$500,000 into community corrections and parole, and an additional \$1.2 million to probation and intensive supervision. Is that accurate?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yes. Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. How much does it cost to stay, on a monthly basis, out at the Work Ethic Camp?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: From the numbers the Fiscal Office has provided me, if you break it down annually, per month, it's \$1,239.

SENATOR BOURNE: And how much is intensive supervision on a monthly basis?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: One hundred thirty-one dollars, and I'd like to point out, if I can...I know this is your time, Senator Bourne, but...

SENATOR BOURNE: No, let's...let's explore it.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...Senator Baker mentioned that those that are at the Work Ethic Camp are ineligible for intensive supervision probation. In fact, you have to be sentenced to a sentence of intensive supervision probation. It's part of your sentence. Those that are at the Work Ethic Camp in McCook are not considered inmates. They're not considered custody of the Department of Corrections. They're under the custody of the intensive supervision probation officer that's assigned to...
