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SENATOR BOURNE: But actually, Senator Synowiecki, that was one of my next questions, so just be patient. So the Work Ethic Camp is \$1,239 per month. Intensive supervision is \$131 per month,...

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...so you're going to save about \$900 a month on the care alone. And then what does...how many millions does it cost to fund the Work Ethic Camp on an annual basis?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: For this...for this budget year, \$3,211,234.

SENATOR BOURNE: So you'll save \$3 million, minus what you've put into probation and intensive supervision and community corrections and parole.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: And the philosophical backdrop of it is, with the 500 additional offenders that we can service under ISP, it may have very positive ramifications with regard to our Department of Corrections budget.

SENATOR BOURNE: And again, these...the type of inmates that are at the Work Ethic Camp are exactly the type of inmate...or I don't know if that's even the right word...are the exact type of individuals that would benefit from probation and intensive supervision?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Those that are at the Work Ethic Camp are those that are sentenced to intensive supervision probation and, as a term and condition of their probation, they're ordered through the three-month program at the Work Ethic Camp.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. Okay, so we are talking about the same type of...

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: It's a philosophical argument. I think that this all can be done on a community-based area. You know, the intensive supervision probation officer has a lot of tools
