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in the community. So, yes, you do have to work as a term and condition of your probation. Yes, you do have to undertake educational attainment requirements. Yes, you have to undertake chemical dependency counseling, should that be an issue that brought you before the courts. So all of the programs that those that are at the Work Ethic Camp and, yes, you have to do community service, for example.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: But do you have to get up at 5:00 in the morning and do calisthenics at 6:00, which I suppose gets subjective? But how do you rate...how can you subject yourself to the discipline of an intensive probation officer? I think that would be a full-time job. And I don't see how that that can become a life-changing event under those circumstances either.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: And I don't...I'm not precisely clear on the rehabilitative value of doing jumping jacks at 5:00 in the morning, you know. I...so many of these programs that are available at the Work Ethic Camp, and I'm not here to debate the merits of the program or how well it...I was told by Raleigh Haas, the director, I was the first state senator to visit that program, out in the Work Ethic...out in McCook. He used to...he's a former probation officer. So, you know, I'm not going to debate. Senator Wehrbein, if you understand, I respect the program. I understand what they're doing. This is just kind of thinking out of the box, putting a discussion piece out here. I've heard all afternoon about...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...structural changes, different ways of doing business. Here's an option. You know, I sat on this amendment. I was teetering on whether or not to put it in. I ultimately put it in. I'll probably take it to a vote but I'm not expecting it to go a long ways, but I hope it will. I hope it will. And we got to start thinking outside of the box. We got to start looking structurally at the way we do business. Here we have an opportunity to service 500 additional ISP offenders at a rate of \$131 a month compared to the \$1,239 a month that it costs us to service offenders at the Work Ethic
