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you're getting it off this blue sheet, that was based on admissions a prior year when it was working at 60 percent capacity. Those figures are...do not apply today. It's at 103 percent of capacity. Our cost is going down, average, obviously, as we increase offender sentencing to Work Ethic Camp. So those are old figures and I see where you get them off this blue sheet that's handed out occasionally to senators, but they're not...they're not correct at this time. We're at 103 percent of capacity and have been at capacity for some time now. So it's issue...it's working, I think. And I can understand what Senator Synowiecki's concern is. We can save money and I think, on my personal thought is, we need to expand facilities like the Work Ethic Camp, keep these people out behind from going to prison. And we're quibbling about whether they were eligible for ISP. No, the fact is they're out there on ISP but, as a condition of ISP, they have to attend the Work Ethic Camp. They don't agree to go to the Work Ethic Camp, they're not eligible for ISP, they go to prison, with the exception a few of these did not commit a serious enough offense to have to be sentenced to ISP or prison, either one. So I, for one, would like to see the work camp expanded and keep these people out of the high-cost beds in prison. So we're headed the wrong direction here, if you ask me, because these people that you say wouldn't go to McCook, close the facility, don't go to McCook, the vast, vast majority of them would go behind the walls. And what...the information I'm given by Corrections is that the average sentence to these offenders would be two years in prison if they don't go through the Work Ethic Camp as a condition of ISP, two years. So we're going to sacrifice these figures, and the figures, as I've said time, you can make numbers say whatever you want them to say. The figures is something less than \$14,000, considerably less than \$14,000 on an annual basis, considerably less, because I think at the time that blue sheet was out...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: ...we were somewhere around 65 percent capacity and they're now over capacity. So those figures are going down dramatically. I'm in favor of expanding work release and the Work Ethic Camp theory to include more people, more capacity.
