measure, but we are in unusual circumstances. We're looking at that '06-07 out year biennium deficit, what, \$296 million, so we are under unusual circumstances and our citizens are looking to us to do some unusual things and to think outside the box and to perhaps close some facilities as we address these deficits. Very quickly, with regard to the offender selection worksheet scores and those that were eligible for the Work Ethic Camp, Senator Baker, it does...for them to be eligible for the Work Ethic Camp it does indeed take into account the gravity of the offense and it takes into account the aggravating and mitigating circumstances with regard to the background of the offender. And all this information is put through a score sheet, if you will, and then it's determined whether or not they're eligible for the Work Ethic Camp. And again, 1,851 individuals last year were eligible for the Work Ethic Camp. Only 103 of them went out of that, out of that subgroup; 200...excuse me, 258 that were eligible, given the gravity of offense, aggravating and mitigating circumstances surrounding the offender, 258 of them that were eligible for the Work Ethic Camp went on traditional probation. Throughout the afternoon, many members spoke of the need for structural changes and I would like just to highlight the component of the amendment that I'm offering, which has to do with the structural changes, and that is the hiring of 20 intensive supervision probation officers to have the state of Nebraska the ability to service, if you will, in the community, to supervise an additional 500 offenders a year so that we can...we can...we can effect dramatic changes in our Department of Corrections budget. You know, the Department of Corrections obviously is behind the glass, and I'm always kind of suspicious when they react negatively towards members of this Legislature looking at progressive ways that we can stem the tide to our highest level end of corrections, which is our penitentiary. We can supervise 500 offenders in the community, 500 additional offenders under intensive supervision probation at a cost of \$131 bucks a month. I mean you compare that to the costs of the penitentiary, you compare that to the cost of the Work Ethic Camp, and there's no comparison. It is indeed the best deal that we could get and still maintain quality supervision over these offenders. They use the electronic monitoring. They go out all nights, all days and all nights, and they check in with these offenders and they do drug testing in the community. They
