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people weren't happy with that, but I'll tell you what. A lot of people respected the fact that this Legislature stepped up to the plate, and that's a plus on the side of the Legislature, in my opinion, as an institution and as we move forward. Now if we follow that with going against what is a long-term philosophy, in my opinion, even though you can make a business case for it, I think it would go against our philosophy of paying as we go in a very, very big way, not just for the possible low-level thing but for other expenditures as well. The constitution allows us to go in debt for very serious matters including war; a limited amount for roads; for water conservation or management dams; or to fund our state colleges or university dormitories and residence halls. And it's very clear about that. I think we would be stretching it to do this. I think the timing isn't right at this moment. I think that this idea, if I'm not wrong, was killed in committee. It would obviously take more than 25 votes to adopt this measure, and so it's a huge hurdle. And, certainly, I commend Senator Brashear for bringing the idea and bring it out here and let's talk about it, but I've got to stand very strongly against the idea. I've got to consider it very similar to...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...things that have been done by other states, these fiscal policies that I don't admire, who have saw fit to try to borrow their way into a more stable financial situation only to find that they not only have to raise money to pay their current expenditures but to pay the interest on deferring the expenditures that they went in debt for. So it is not I don't think a sound thing to do. I don't think the timing is right. I don't think there are 30 votes for it. And if there are, certainly I will be very surprised. But for all of those reasons, I certainly stand firmly opposed to the measure and I would hope that we can continue to look hard for the right time and the right solution, that I don't think this is it. Thank you.
