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set of bonds sold go to the General Fund.

SENATOR KREMER: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: So I'm a lay person from western Nebraska. I don't see how this flies in the face of the constitutional language. I also have to point out that...two issues. The Revenue Committee did hear from the Attorney General and his staff. The Revenue Committee did not take any action on this. Our Chairman, I see, is gone. Our Vice Chairman is gone. I wish those people were here. They're not, but I can speak as a Revenue Committee member. I can't...I'm not going to put words in any of our members' mouths, but we heard that...the various theories, I guess, arguments that...position the staff put together, the Attorney General and his staff. We should have a good idea or know for certain what we have November 1. The Revenue Committee did not take any action on that. We did not feel it was appropriate at that time. So you have at least the Revenue Committee saying, no, we don't need to do anything now. The second issue, Senator Brashear takes great pain in making sure there's a distinction between this bill and the one...

SENATOR KREMER: Time.

SENATOR BAKER: ...that the Transportation Committee killed in committee. Thank you.

SENATOR KREMER: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Janssen, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. I have not got my bill back from the...or my amendment back from the bill drafter yet, but I can explain a little bit more to you. I have some numbers here. So if we went back to just a 3 percent surcharge on the electrical bills, it would raise \$46 million in 15 months. And if we use Senator Hartnett's income tax, it would be a 5 percent increase on the income tax would raise \$51 million for 2004. And if we used the sales tax a quarter of a percent through 10-1 of '05, that would raise another \$61 million, which is \$158 million that we could get in that, say, about a year and a half.
