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present time, I think that's probably the best way to go. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Louden. Madam Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Thank you, Mr. President. I have a priority motion. Senator Chambers would move to bracket LB 1090 until April 1, 2004.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open on your bracket motion.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. I will not take us to a vote, but even if I did, it would bracket it until tomorrow and we would have a chance to come back and resume what we're doing this evening. But I've heard some comments that I have to respond to. First of all, I'll mention what Senator Schrock had proposed. He's speaking from frustration. He said now he thinks Senator Brashear ought to be given a shot again to run his shortened version. We would call that "Brashear Lite." (Laughter) I still don't think it's going anywhere. I don't believe that the surtax, or as I say, "madamtax" will go anywhere, the surcharge on the electricity. The income tax, I think, is what we're going to come down to. I don't believe the sales tax has enough juice. That's my opinion. I can be shown to be in error. I do not believe that the attitude people have right now, I do not believe that the emotions under which people are laboring right now will be the same as tomorrow, after people have had a chance to go home, relax, get some sleep, think a bit, and then come back. Things always look far gloomier, they are far more stressful, when people themselves are stressed out or tired. When mental fatigue sets in, people do not think as clearly as they would otherwise. Their wills are weakened or they just shut down. Interrogation of one of the most effective sorts is based on just repetition without allowing the interrogatee to have any surcease. Keep it going. So I do not believe that anything this evening will get enough votes to be ensured of passage. People are not responding only to the proposals that are before us. Many things have been said. The lobby has done its damage, and people are still out there continuing to throw wood on the
