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Hartnett. The income tax is where I think we ultimately are going to come down. Everybody knows how regressive the sales tax is, but that is not before us. It will be before us tomorrow. And maybe everything that we're trying to do will take 33 votes and maybe not. I had said the other day that I don't believe anybody on this floor is like me when it comes to staking out a position and holding to it, not just for one day, not for just an hour, no, not for just a day, Senator. And I'm not going to call names. Not for just a year, but always. Always.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I didn't hear you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I guess I won't be able to go on for always right now. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Beutler,

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Bromm, members of the Legislature. I don't know what Senator Chambers is intending by this bracket motion.
