here. Someone has already asked for it and read it. If you want to review what he said yesterday, it's better than me repeating it, because I think, once again, he laid out the case very well. My sense is there's not very many of you today think that we should not face it, so I think we've made some progress. I'm not going to...I've taken no vote count, but my sense is that a majority of you at this point feel we should face it. You just don't want to drink the poison pill to solve it. And I'm going to comment on Senator Beutler's sales tax that it is true, that's what the Governor and our committee...we didn't take a solid position on it as Appropriations, but we do. The Governor had said that he would support a sales tax. And if you...as I reminded you yesterday, we were very careful to say that when I went to the Revenue Committee that it's equivalent of a half-cent sales tax with \$122 million but it would be the Revenue Committee's decision. Since we've had the debate all day yesterday on three possibilities and now this becomes a fourth, I'm going to stick my neck out and ask that you start seriously considering some kind of consensus. From my viewpoint, I can go the income tax. There's advantages and disadvantages, one of which the disadvantage is it doesn't kick in soon enough. It does meet some of your requirements in that you perceive it as fair, based on the ability to pay, and it doesn't go to property taxes. It doesn't raise quite as much as Senator Hartnett has. Remember, most of all these are destined for the Cash Reserve to be ultimately used for the low-level nuclear waste. I think it was agreed yesterday, I think most agree that we do not have to have this to balance the budget in July 1, 2004, to June 30, 2005. We are looking at the low-level nuclear lawsuit, specifically. So we can do the income tax. It's a little awkward kicking in. The money doesn't come in as fast, but it would be there. The sales tax would kick in October 1, so by the first of January there would be some money. I can live with the sales tax myself; income, sales, or perhaps some of you will consider a combination, let's say a quarter of a cent sales tax and something less than the full amount that Senator Hartnett is proposing in his income tax. So I hope that there will be some discussion on that. We're having to make this decision in public debate. I think it's important to understand where we're at. I don't sense a lot of support for bonding. I don't sense a lot of support for the electrical
