SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers and Senator Brashear. Would you come forward, please? Senator Brashear and Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, you're recognized.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, I'm withdrawing that request to divide the issue...

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is withdrawn.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the question. And I will offer my amendment now. What I intend to do is keep us on this bill for as long as I possibly can. Senator Brashear has an amendment that has, I think, about 21 pages. I will venture to say that nobody, including Senator Brashear, has read every one of these 21 pages. Why do I say that? Because much of it is existing law, and there are relatively few places, relatively speaking, where underlined material is found. Most people will read that underlined material, if they read anything, but not the existing law that it is being incorporated into and which it is replacing if that occurs anywhere in the bill. So rather than try to divide the question, I will make motions to strike each individual section. But this amendment that I'm offering is for the purpose of asking Senator Brashear a question. And I was hoping he could finish his discussion before I had to interrupt him. That's why I was going through the preliminaries. Senator Brashear,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...this amendment--and I'm going to offer a similar one on page 2--is found on page 1, in line 22. I'm...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm going to tell him, then I'm going to ask him if he'll answer the question. I'm striking the word "substantially" from that line. Would you answer a question or two...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Brashear?
