SENATOR BRASHEAR: I can't remember.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Okay. Well, what would you be looking for from me, short of my capitulation, in order for you to adopt this amendment, agree to this amendment?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Well, if you have other amendments of...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thirty.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...equal or greater gravity,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If I reduce my number of amendments from 30 to 25, what do you say?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Quantitatively, it's not an improvement. Let's go to five.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Which can be subdivided? Or can they...?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: No, no, no.
