different situation. And I'll admit that this is a unique situation and it's tempting because it's a unique situation, to open up this new line of credit. But just as I believe too many lines of credit are available in society today and it's going to turn around and bite us in the future, I don't want to do that here in state government. And realizing that Senator Brashear has pulled back the numbers a bit, certainly it started more, I mean, his original intent, it's my understanding anyway, that it would be to finance the entire shortfall contained in our budget. And regardless of how you look at it though, it is truly a new line of credit. And it bothers me when we have a trust fund, truly a trust fund, when you talked about user fees, whether it's gas tax or sales tax on a vehicle, going to provide for the infrastructure associated therewith. And the Legislature has tried the trust fund label in other areas of government, but it's drastically different. Whether it's the healthcare trust fund, how those dollars got there and how they're spent, it's much different than the Highway Trust Fund. Whether it's the Environmental Trust Fund, much different; that is not even contained in the state constitution. But we have the Highway Trust Fund. There might be some points about the automatic tax increase that is a mechanism here, that I don't really care for, but it is a plan in place and I believe we need to honor that plan. And we can do that, I believe, through better fiscal restraint and coming back, if we need to, in a special session. I hate to say that. I understand that there are many sacrifices made during the interim that exist, that are out there. Per hour, it probably does cost me as much to come to special session as it does others. I do have to come further than anyone else and it certainly is an imposition in my own nonpolitical career, and it's bothersome to me to think about that. But opening a new line of credit,...
