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body on, and if they don't pass, certainly if the will is to put the bill aside for a day or so, we can easily do that. But to put the bill aside right now, which we could do, without having had a substantive vote on anything, I don't know what we're going to discuss when we...when we go off the floor for sure. So my request is that we identify which of these ideas that we'd like to vote on and we try to get to a vote on them and call the question once in awhile and if there's...if someone wants to withdraw their amendment, not take a vote, fine, but let's try to do some substantive action that will...that will help us decide where we're all at on this picture. And that's certainly a powerless request, but just some thoughts I would like to share with you. Thanks.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Speaker Bromm. The next speaker is Senator Maxwell, followed by Senators Beutler and Wehrbein and others.

SENATOR MAXWELL: Thank you, Madam President. I was hoping to engage Speaker Bromm, in fact give him the balance of my time, if he wanted it. I guess I want to make an observation and then get his response to it. I'll wait for a second until he's free, Madam Speaker.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Speaker Bromm, would you yield to a question?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR MAXWELL: I want to pick up the thread between you and Senator Brashear, and I'll give you the balance of my time to respond. If I've followed it, Senator Brashear's main point is we're in a 10 percent trap and that's a compelling reason to do AM3477. And then I think your response was, well, no, we aren't in a 10 percent trap; we can change that if we want to. Then I think that he got up later and said, well, no, we can't, and he cited a couple propositions of law. And so what I'd like to do is get your response. You can have the balance of my time, if you want it, to take the next step in that conversation. That's what I'm trying to wrestle through. Thank you.
