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imprecise, that can almost guarantee litigation because you're going to put powerful interests on a collision course, and one is not going to want to take low in order to benefit the other. So why don't you just strike that word? If the bill doesn't go anywhere, you haven't hurt a thing. If it does go somewhere, you've cut out an area for litigation. But you probably will take the easy way out and vote no. But you still won't be rid of me. For all you know, if you voted yes on that last one you could have been rid of me, but I'm not going to tell you in advance what it's going to take to whip me on the battlefield. Good gracious alive! You know what Rommel did, known as the "Desert Fox"? He took telephone poles, disguised them as large weapons, and held off the enemy just with a successful threat, a ruse. He was known as the "Desert Fox" from the way he fought in North Africa, but he was known to be a very astute military mind. He was not a Nazi, by the way. He was a German, but he was not a Nazi. And if Rommel, if Erwin Rommel was a Nazi, I would say, heil Hitler, because Rommel had more respect for black men than the Christian Americans. When black South African troops, they were made to fight for a country that treated them like subhumans, when they were captured by Rommel's army, these racist South Africans approached him the way the Americans did the French. The Americans said, don't give these black soldiers the Croix de Guerre or any other award; we don't treat them like that in America, and they'll get the big (inaudible). That is a matter of history what this United States government did to black people. So the South Africans said, ah, we will follow what the Americans did with the French. And they went to Rommel. They said in our country black people and white people do not live together in the same place, so we don't want you to put white South African prisoners in the same place as black South African prisoners. And you know what Rommel said, the German, the one fighting for the Fuhrer and the fatherland and Nazism? You all belong to the same army, you all wear the same uniform, you were all captured on the same battlefield, you are all prisoners of war and you're from the same country, and you will all be in the same compound under the same circumstances. That's what the German said, while the Christian Americans had a segregated army, where black men could come back from Europe and be lynched in uniform in the United States of America. So here Erwin Rommel put his large poles up
