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can't change that. I am asking, I believe, or at least I'm checking out the advisability of amending...offering a severability clause now that Senator Brashear feels that could be a problem. And I've seen many, many bills go through here, and there are cases where that has been challenged and in many, many cases, the courts have not found it to be a problem if we include more than one bill or more than one subject. But I think it would probably be advisable, certainly, to have the severability clause. I think we're treating this the same way we treat any other judgment. The interest rate would be same as if I had a judgment against me and couldn't pay it. Under state court rules and the federal rules provide that at some point in time when the judgment goes through execution that the state rules apply. And so I'm certainly willing to listen, but I think this is the appropriate thing to do. And, again, I support the Chambers amendment, encourage the body to do so. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Louden, on the Chambers amendment to the Bromm amendment.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I certainly don't want to get into a discussion with high-dollar lawyers because I'm sure they know what they're doing. But just from what I've learned from chasing cows and cabling hay, it looks like to me you're going to have to start someplace. Nobody has done anything for eight or nine years, however many. I guess you'd have to take that up with the people that have been around here that long, but if you start someplace, what have you got to lose if you introduce this now. If you lose on the case that's before us, you're just right back where you were anyway, and at least you have something started for any future litigation that could come down the pike. So I agree with Senator Bromm. I think something needs to get started sooner than later, and this is certainly sooner than it has been. So I think this is something that can be done with and I don't see where we have that much to lose. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
