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Judiciary Committee is a discussion that probably will take some time and is one of those areas of law that encompass...or one of those bills that encompasses a lot of areas of law. And so Senator Chambers' concerns I think are warranted, in the fact that there are some issues in here that need to be addressed. And we could have gone forward with a proposal that would have been done halfheartedly, or would not have opened up the level or the volume of information that is in it. However, we believe that in the fairness to the body for the discussion that we are going to have, that the issues that are held in the committee amendment are generally those issues that have been deemed as part of the age of majority statute, not a separate public policy debate. Now, this will be a separate public policy debate on these issues. I recognize that. However, we have a list of a lot of other issues that were intended on being included, but when we went through and looked at why those ages were set, there was a strong policy argument why they were set at that age at the time of enactment. Those were removed from the committee amendment. And so from the standpoint of what's in the committee amendment, there are a lot of issues. And obviously, the handout that Senator Brashear distributed to you outlines some of those, as far as what it is that we are intending to fix. But remember that the intent of the underlying bill or the underlying idea is to, instead of fixing a small problem here or an issue there, to look at the broader issue and to figure out a way to do this. Granted, this is going to be an opportunity, if you will, for a lot of discussion, a lot of amendments. But again, the idea comes back to those areas of law that were generally determined to be age of majority or age of majority reference, as opposed to separate public policy decisions, are in the committee amendments. That is the underlying amendment. I do not discount any of the discussion that we need to have on that. But I would again redirect your attention to the amendment that is before us. That ensures that this bill...or this committee amendment, if adopted, would ensure that child support is not affected retroactively. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Erdman. The Chair recognizes Senator Bourne.
