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guardianship, I wasn't trying...I wasn't implying that somehow that guardianship would change. I'm just simply saying that there's a lot of things that are dependent on the age of majority that we don't know about, that we can't envision, and that aren't contemplated in this bill. And what Senator Erdman said was accurate, that...but I wasn't trying to say their benefits would be cut off. I'm just saying there's far-reaching implications. And then to demonstrate that, I was telling you a situation of a constituent of mine, or any constituent of any of yours, who has a disabled child that needs to have a guardianship in place prior to the time that child turns 19. And that's one of the reasons why I think we should extend this out a little bit further. Even though there is a delayed effective date of January 1, I think we should extend it even further to allow some of these people the time to get their guardianships in place. I'm going to continue to listen to the debate. And I will support Senator Erdman's amendment, because I think it does add clarity. But I'm at this point reluctant to support the bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature. Senator Cudaback, could I ask Senator Brashear to yield...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield?

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...again, please?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Brashear, for a question?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, in scoping out this initiative further, I wanted to restate the question that I tried to address to you at the end of my time last time, which is essentially this: Have you identified, or do you know exactly which sections of the bill--maybe talking to your blue sheet here--affect the fiscal note? If we keep which sections...oh, I see Senator Wehrbein is waving a sheet in the air. Senator, I
