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issues over the summer or come back and have actual bills next year, as Senator Chambers is suggesting, and have hearings on those and get a better idea of what we're doing here. This makes me just a little bit nervous. So thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Smith, on the Erdman amendment to the committee amendments to LB 391. He waives the opportunity to speak. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President, members of the body, I had my light on earlier and I turned it off. I looked at the committee statement and I saw that Senator Tyson did not vote for the bill out of committee and I...and there was a disturbance and something in the hallway and I think most people missed his comments. But I think, if I can summarize what...it simply was it's too broad and it maybe has consequences we don't know at this time. And so I guess at the first blush with this bill it looks like that's a good move, but I think the discussion this morning, I'm kind of queasy about doing something with it at the time, because I guess Senator Tyson is on the committee and usually votes for good legislation. And so I'm going to follow his lead and probably not vote for the bill as it is in its present form. And I would give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers, if he so desires.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Members of the Legislature, if this bill had been narrowly crafted and presented to us, it would still require discussion. Let's say that you want to have the allowance in the law for a person 18 years old to sign a lease, so that those, who come from a great distance from the University of Nebraska and want to live on campus, can sign the lease without their parents having to do it for them. There would still be issues raised because if they don't pay, are the parents going to be held liable? If the student does not have an independent source of income, is the university going to allow that person to sign a lease and look only to that person for the rent to be paid? And if that person has no income and they require the parents to cosign, well, the lender looks at the stability of
