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the cosigner, so the parents would still have to be involved. None of these issues are as simple or as clear-cut as they may seem on their face. Suppose you could get around the difficulty of signing a lease while you're 18. Does it mean that because we would agree perhaps that somebody 18 should be able to sign a lease that we should extrapolate from that and say that person should be able to sign any and every kind of contract? There are many things in this society that could qualify as hustles. Even adults fall prey to it. So certain types of transactions can be nullified by somebody as old as I am if I do it within a certain number of days. You may get information. You may think twice and you may see that you acted hastily. So if graybeards and no-beards can get into difficulty signing contracts, we should not transport all of those problems from where we are to our children. Many of these youngsters will still be in high school. Let's look at the Terminally Ill Act. They could be reading something in the paper about it. They could get to woofing, like kids will do, and they could dare each other to sign one of these papers that would say that I want to make a declaration, if certain conditions befall me, I don't want certain treatment or any of the other things allowed under that act. The child might sign it and...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...forget it, but then wind up in an accident and the parents may want to have something to say about it, but oh no, at second hour at Benson High School, this child signed one of these papers, and what this child signed governs. So forget what you as a parent will say. This 18-year-old child signed away the right to have this treatment so it will not be given. And if the statute authorizes that 18-year-old to make that declaration under the Terminally Ill Act, that is what is binding. Is that what you want to do in this bill this morning? Did you even know that was in it? When are you all going to realize that I cannot always do all of the work for all the legislators? This is not my bill. I had no part to play in writing the amendment, but I'd venture to say I've done more work on it than even...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers.
