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I would...I'd give my time to Senator Brashear.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brashear, committee amendments.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. Thank you, Senator Schimek. We have been having some dialogue with regard to this matter and, in order to facilitate forward motion, and I'll be corrected by Senator Erdman or Senator Chambers, here's what...is it all right if I outline it a little bit, Senator Erdman? Here's what we're proposing. Committee amendments cannot be withdrawn and so I would ask that, and we would ask that, you defeat the committee amendment. That will return the bill to the five-page green copy. Then you will see on your viewer Senator Erdman has filed an amendment that Senator Chambers and I have agreed to support subject to further work and consideration among all three of us and any others between General File and Select File. We are effectively gutting the bill then if we do this, if we would defeat the committee amendment and adopt the Erdman amendment. We are gutting the bill in terms of age of majority and we are returning to the issue of how and when a minor may disavow a contract for the necessities of life. And I'm not trying to be pro or con. I'm trying to be informative. There are still issues in that area that both Senator Erdman and Senator Chambers acknowledge that we need to work through, but we have developed this methodology in order to facilitate the movement of the bill today and to refine it to a point where we may be able to salvage forward progress. So I would...again, I would urge the defeat of the Judiciary Committee amendment. I would yield time to Senator Erdman...Senator Chambers, in order that he can continue this discussion. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, as far as Senator Brashear went, what he said is crystal-clear. This is what I would add to the mix. This area of dealing with contracts is complicated. Only a lawyer ought to carry a bill like this, not disparaging Senator Erdman. There are many legal issues that are involved that won't appear on the face of the
