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listening. I'm sure the media will pick up on it. There's still life out there after LB 536. They would qualify for, there will be LB 775 incentives, which is a multimillion dollar incentive if they structure their business correctly, question their...structure their business correctly. LB 620, I talked to a mayor of a town this morning, said that they were prepared to TIF the plant site, tax increment financing. We have talked to Department of Economic Development on some issues and LB 775 concerns. We could possibly go with a program for these new plants, forgiveness of personal property tax. These plants are typically 60 percent personal property tax expense. We could help them with that regard. The local communities would still have the real estate tax, they'd still have the jobs, they'd still have the increased price of corn. So there is life after LB 536 if they don't qualify. If you go back and look at legislative intent, we put that 100,000 gallon...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: ...on an annual basis in the bill because we, at that time...I think Senator Dierks, Senator Cunningham may have had some input on this...there were some small farmer-owned plants that anticipated possibly building some 100,000- to 200,000-gallon annual basis production. We didn't want to disqualify them for LB 536; hence, we lowered the max...or minimum threshold to 100,000 gallons. If you look at legislative intent, it was never the intent to have people qualify with portable stills, build the plant later situation. It's pretty clear. So I think also I tried to forewarn my constituents that the people that are coming in and suggesting they build these temporary plants to qualify, need to tell them the whole story. They could qualify. It's an 8-month...or 8-year program, 96 months. Your qualification standards start when the first drop of ethanol is produced.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BAKER: Did you say time?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I did, Senator.
