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country that probably would be donating to the ethanol program that wouldn't have any vested interest in it other than the fact that it...they get less...they get less of their tax refund money back and it probably raises the price of their corn and their feed to the cattle. So I really can't support that part of the bill. I still think that if we're going to use it for the benefit of corn and that sort of thing, then that's where it should be. If you want to raise your checkoff on up to whatever amount you want to to make it funding, but those that are using it or benefiting from it should be the ones to pay for it. As far as I'm concerned, I think that LB 775, if they build a big enough plant and can generate that much of an income for the community and create that many jobs, then I don't mind seeing them receive some LB 775 funding or something on that order, but I don't think it should be put on the gasoline or I don't think it should be put on other areas that don't receive a direct benefit from the ethanol product. I think eventually we will be overbuilt with ethanol. Nobody knows for sure which way some of this research is going, whether there's going to be that much ethanol in the future or not. If the price of corn gets higher, then will ethanol be a viable product to be made? So this is something that I think we have to be very careful about where we stick the funding and whose money we're spending. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Louden. Senator Hartnett. Is Senator Hartnett present? Yes, he is; on the Landis amendment.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President and members of the body; Senator Baker, could I ask you some questions?

SENATOR HARTNETT: Senator Baker, would you yield?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: What's it cost...if I was going to build...if you and I were going to build a plant today, an ethanol plant, would it cost us...

SENATOR BAKER: Typically...
