SENATOR BAKER: That's true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There's nothing in the rules that says he can prohibit amendments from being offered, is there?

SENATOR BAKER: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if I'm the only one offering amendments, his choice is the first one that I offer or the second one I offer. Right, as to which one will go first?

SENATOR BAKER: I don't know that this has ever been used, and I don't want to put words in our Speaker's mouth, but...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Wouldn't it be good for us to find out how our rules are going to operate since this is the first time this was done?

SENATOR BAKER: It probably wouldn't hurt anything.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's what I think, too, so I'm going to help us get a little education this afternoon, take some time and see if I can persuade my colleagues that we ought to take this gas tax out of this bill. Now, I've heard my rural colleagues say that the farm community, that "ag" is the term they use, should...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...not bear the cost of this bill. I don't represent ag interests, although on occasion I represent them better...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...than the ag senators do. Oh, you said time?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I did. Thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.
