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But to say that the whole price is relationship to ethanol plants is not correct. There's a lot of other things that play into that figure. I think we all benefit from it. The state benefits from it. The communities benefit from it. I know when it looked like the Central City plant was not going to get their production application okayed by the DEQ, that was going...it was a terrible blow to Central City. They were depending on that for new jobs, new tax base. As I mentioned earlier when I spoke, that when you add the tax base of \$22 million, \$25 million in real estate taxes, real estate assessment, that benefits about \$230,000 to \$300,000. I think KAAPA said that they're going to contribute to the school system about \$300,000 a year. That money then does not have to come from state aid, because that local effort increases by \$300,000; that's \$300,000 less than state aid. The ethanol plants will benefit. The state it benefits. Motorists it benefits. Corn growers, I agree, and the corn growers have been willing to step up and take part of the load, but not all of it. And I think that it has been a very good compromise. I think the compromise also is that we do not revert back to the Highway Trust Fund...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR KREMER: ...if the EPIC fund should run dry. I think it's a very good compromise, and I think it's a balance that I'm willing to take. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Kremer. Senator Schrock, you're recognized to speak.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Madam President, members of the Legislature, for my urban colleagues that are listening, this is my twelfth year in the Legislature. I don't believe...I believe every time there's been an issue for Omaha and Lincoln on tax incentives, I've been there for you. I voted for the Micron bill. It's probably good we didn't get that, because I think they went bankrupt, didn't they, Senator Chambers? I voted for the Micron bill. I think we had a special session once for some incentives for Omaha. I've been there for you all the time. I'd like to see a little reciprocity here. Yes, you can put the tax on corn if you want. And people can say, well, \$3.00 corn is a good
