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their projects on to the State Fair, and so I am very supportive of continuing the fair. I believe it builds leadership in young people, which is a very important trait. It keeps these young people also off of the street and involved in educational projects. With that, I hope that you will continue to support this resolution, and I turn the rest of my time back to the Chair. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Members, Speakers, member...Mr. Speaker and members of the body, I think I support Senator Chambers' amendment and Senator Bourne's. Senator Chambers, could I ask you a question?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Microphone malfunction) Yes.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Is it possible to separate? You got state funds, which I agree with. I was thinking about, you know, cities and their financing, so forth. Is this possible for them to do this? That's, I guess, my question. For a city like...we're talking about the city of Lincoln here, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. What are you asking me now specifically?

SENATOR HARTNETT: Well, is...you want it to come from sales and income tax...or not sales tax, property tax to fund this. Is that correct?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I don't know where Lincoln would come up with their money, but the way Senator Bourne's amendment is crafted they can obtain it from the city, any other private or public entity. That's the language. It doesn't say how the city would come up with the money, but I want to be sure that nothing comes from the state. And the form of the amendment
