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other matter that he is covering, but this I think is...makes the bill better and I would urge everyone to vote for it. And if Senator Beutler would like the rest of my time, he can have it or I'll just return it to the Chair. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Beutler, you're recognized to close on your amendment. He waives closing. The question before us is the adoption of the Beutler amendment, AM3091. All in favor please vote aye and opposed nay. Please record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Beutler's amendment.

SPEAKER BROMM: The amendment is adopted. The next item on the bill, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Tyson would move to amend with AM3244. (Legislative Journal page 1156.)

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson, you're recognized to open on your amendment.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. AM3244 is the other betterment spoken of in the Attorney General's Opinion. Those of you with short-term memory loss may not recognize these yellow sheets which were passed out about two weeks ago, but they are several pages from the International Building Code. What the amendment does, aside from adopting...inserting reference to the negotiated rulemaking process several times, it also ties the act into limitations that are set forth for allowable height in building areas that are in the state building code in Section 71-6403. I believe we are currently on the year 2000 building code, but this is something that has been updated from time to time historically and will keep pace I think with events as they occur in the building business. I would offer you this and ask for your support for AM3244. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
